No One Makes It Alone

Success doesn't happen alone, especially in the legal profession. Somebody makes a connection Or somebody warns you. Or saves you from stepping in something you

can't wipe off. And that's what mentorship is about.

In our profession, we often talk about "mentorship." The word itself is ancient (literally), coming from the Greek tale of Mentor, the man who looked after Odysseus's son, Telemachus, while Odysseus spent ten years at war and another ten years trying to get home.

Although the Greeks did not anticipate it, practicing law is its own kind of odyssey. There are trials, twists, detours, and days that feel like you've gone to hell and come back with a filing deadline. But you don't have to make the journey alone.

Today, mentorship displays itself in many forms. It's not limited to an awkward coffee meeting or a formal check-in. Sometimes it's a quick call. A scribbled note on a motion. A quiet word in the hallway after court. At its base, a mentor is someone who looks out for you. At its best, mentorship is a conversation between someone who has endured, and someone who has not yet had the pleasure of enduring.

A mentor can help you figure out which battles are worth fighting, and which ones just make you jaded. A good mentor tells you when to speak up and when to sit still. They've argued the wrong motion, trusted the wrong client, and said the wrong thing in front of the right judge (or the right thing in front of the wrong judge). They've stepped in every puddle, taken every wrong turn, and, yet, somehow lived to talk about it. And if you're smart enough to listen, they just might tell you how they

But mentorship isn't a one-way street.

It's a symbiotic relationship that the mentor can gain something from too. There's something about helping someone else that knocks the dust off your principles and makes you remember what justice was supposed to look like before you started billing in six-minute increments. In the end, both sides walk away better equipped to face whatever the job throws at them next.


